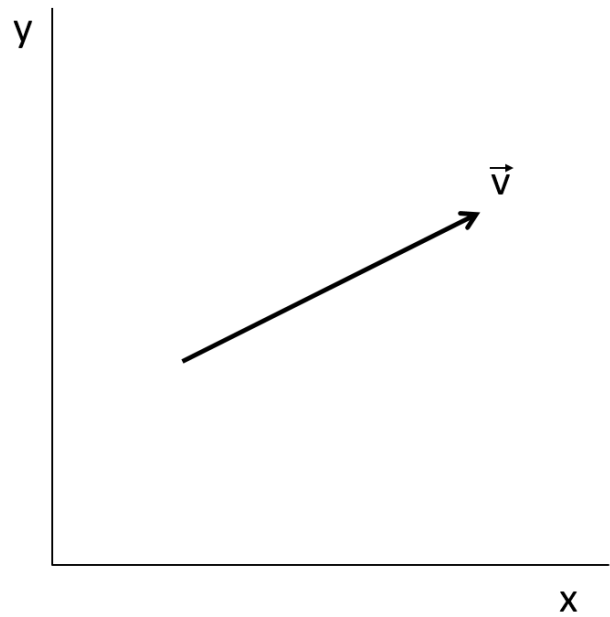
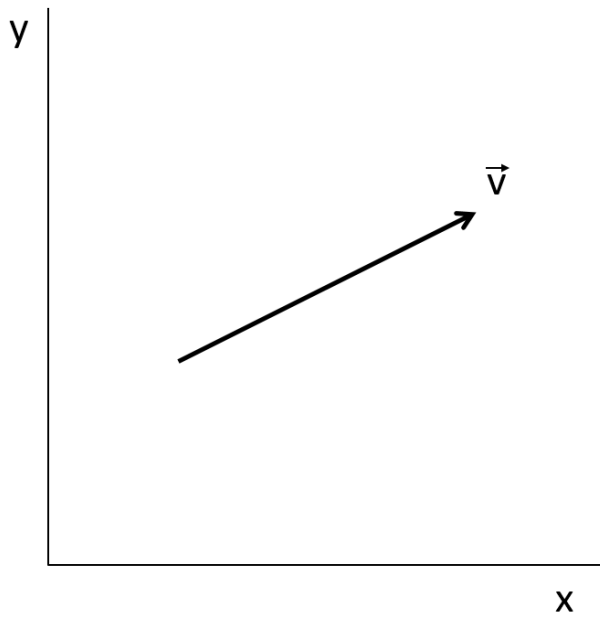
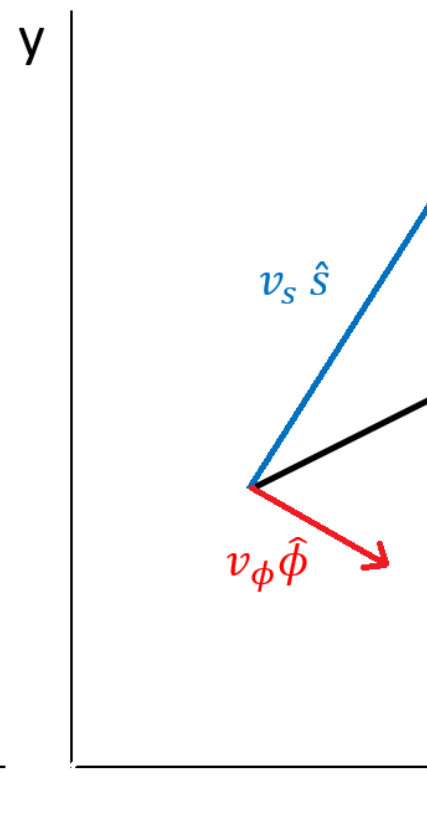
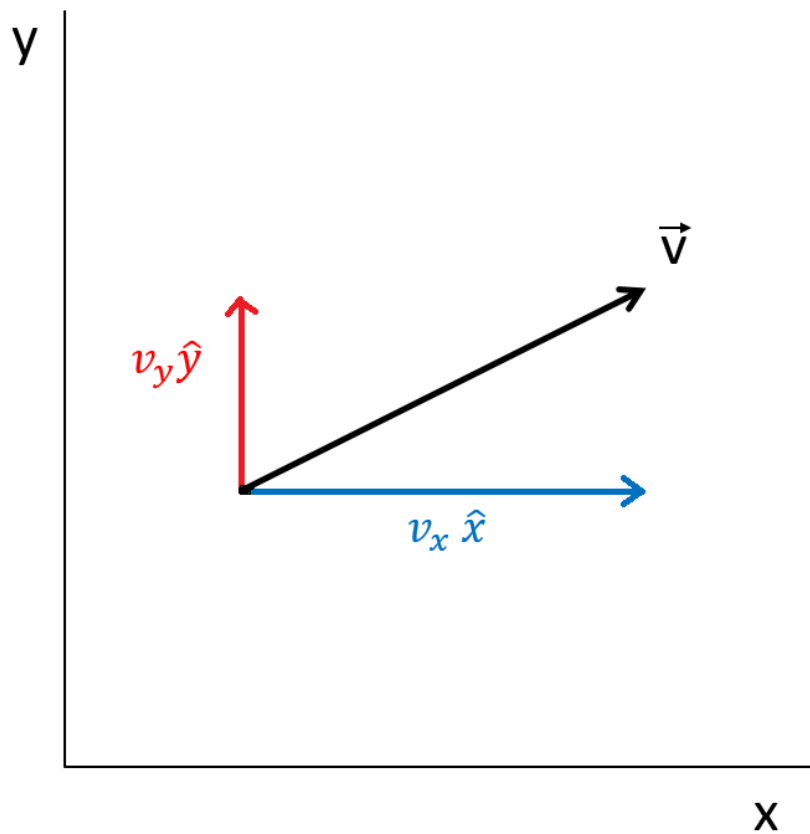




1. In the first figure, draw the projections of $\vec{v}$ onto the rectangular basis vectors $\hat{x}$ and $\hat{y}$.
